Dear Mary,

Since it is the first year anniversary of Chris's death, and now that the shock and sadness is getting a little easier to deal with, I just wanted to thank you for everything you did for Chris and Dempsey while they were with you. You are an amazing woman and you provide a wonderful service to our vets who are coming home needing help. Enclosed, please find a small donation to "Operation Freedom Paws". I wish I could afford a lot more but I also know that every dollar helps. Mary, I also want to tell you that even though Chris had lots of problems that he couldn't overcome (mainly Alcoholism), I have to tell you that he was at his "happiest time" when he was out with his service dog Dempsey. He took her everywhere he could. He used to complain (jokingly) that it would take him fortyfive minutes to go to the store to get a gallon of milk because all of the people and

kids in the stores would always stop him and Dempsey to pet her. (In reality, he loved it when people would stop him and Dempsey). Every time I would see Chris when he was having a rough time with life, the expression on his face and his mood would instantly "perk-up" when he was with Dempsey.

Mary what you do for the Vets is truly wonderful and I know personally that the service dogs that vou train for the vets truly makes a "Hugh Difference" in their lives.

Charlie and Daniella Graduated SFSU May 2014

What about this program/process attracted you?

I was attracted to the opportunity of being able to train with your service dog, instead of having someone train a dog for you and having to wait a few years. I had been looking for a place to train my own hearing service dog for 2 years before I learned about OFP.

Meet Daniella and Charlie

How did you learn about OFP?

It was March 2012 and I was at work, I met a couple

and their dogs. I noticed that they had a vest on and

that they were service dogs, I asked the couple if I

asked how they got their dogs to be certified, and if

they had someone else train them, or if they trained

the dogs themselves. They looked at each other and smiled, then mentioned Operation Freedom paws. The

gentleman handed me an OFP business card and said

could pet them. They smiled and said yes. I then

that I should call Mary. The rest is history.

I was born deaf, however my mother did not find out until I was three years old. The doctors kept assuring my mom that I was fine and that she was being a worrisome first-time parent. When I was three my parents realized that I still hadn't developed speech, and communicated by pointing at everything. I did not using words or word-like sounds like most toddlers. Once it was verified that I was profoundly deaf, my parents continued to work with me and mainstreamed me into "regular school."

My hearing disability keeps me from hearing certain sounds and noises, such as a doorbell ringing, or someone calling my name from behind me; I relied on my parents to let me know of these sounds and noises. I started looking for potential service dogs because I was about to venture out on my own, living in a new city, going to a new school, away from what was comfortable for me. I wanted to feel safe.

I also wanted to have the experience of going through the good times and not so good times that comes with training a dog, and that's what I love about the program; it allowed me to learn and come up with solutions that work best for both me and my dog. I truly believe that training with my own dog has made it easier to bond with him, and has created an atmosphere where sometime he instinctively knows what he needs to alert me.

Did Mary match you with Charlie?

Mary did not match Charlie with me, but I do wonder how It would be if she did match me with a dog. Mary did have to assess Charlie to see if he would be eligible to become a service dog.

What drew you to him? Was he the automatic choice for you?

Once my mom convinced me that a hearing dog would be a good thing for me, I started looking for places that provide service dogs. These organizations were usually breeding the dogs. There is nothing wrong with breeding specific dogs for a task, but in my heart I knew I wanted a shelter dog, even if it did end up being a purebred, I just wanted to save a life.

I came across several dogs that I was drawn to during my search, however things

always fell through. They were not meant to be. It took a year of searching and educating myself in what to look for in a potential service dog before I saw Charlie. I took every opportunity I could to see dogs in pet events, local shelters, etc. then I saw Charlie on petfinder and he was adorable! Of course I think all dogs are adorable. I looked at his info and it said, "submissive, playful, good on leash, good with kids." This is typical bio for dogs that I have seen, and it didn't tell me much, so I took it one step further and emailed the organization to arrange a meeting with his foster parents and maybe spend some time with "Bugsy" (his former name). The following week my mom and I drove

to Oakland in one of the craziest and worst storms of the year. When we got there and I met Bugsy, we played, I spent some time with him and without a doubt I knew we were perfect for each other. And so began our journey together.

Now that you are certified, what are the challenges you face out in public?

Some people think Charlie resembles a pit bull, and although he is not, that doesn't stop people from being scared and walking off the sidewalk onto the street just to avoid us during our walks. It also does not stop them from discriminating against him or harshly stating their opinion about his ability to help me based on his breed. Now that we are certified our challenge is to educate people that specific breed doesn't matter; Charlie IS certified and IS just as capable of being a hearing service dog as a Golden Retriever or Lab Retriever.

How is your life different now with Charlie?

I didn't notice it right away, but I am more independent at home and outside of home. I often imagine "what if"---what if I went away to school and I didn't have Charlie? I know that answer; I would have been so afraid to walk out the door, walk home from my night classes, afraid to go to sleep peacefully thinking, "what if

someone breaks, in and I can't hear them." "What if someone follows me and I don't hear them?" Charlie gives me a peace of mind and I trust him, he has my back and I will always have his...tail... LOL.

What advice would you give someone thinking a service dog is right for them?

My advice would be to go for it! I say contact Mary and get assessed. It could open your world to a brand new one and you can create "a new normal," a normal that is fit just for you and your service dog. It doesn't matter that people will judge, or stare, or think they have the



right to "approve, or disapprove." they are not going to be doing the training, creating memories or personal achievements with you, all that matters is YOU and your four legged, furry best friend. There will be lots of ups and downs, but I think that it makes you a stronger team and will create a stronger bond because you and your service dog are conquering the world one paw and step at a time!





If you could notify the public of anything in particular about service dogs, what would it be?

Service dogs come in all shapes, sizes, and breeds. They serve all types of people with different disabilities. When you see a service dog, remember that they are an extension of the person they are with, they are helping to service their special needs, and require your full understanding and cooperation.


