#### A Year in Review

Welcome to the inaugural issue of The Operation Freedom Paws Quarterly Newsletter! This first one may be a little longer than those to come so we can catch you up on all that has been happening here at OFP. The whirlwind began last year when founder, Mary Cortani was named one of CNN's Top Ten Heroes. Because of this outstanding recognition, the public's awareness of Operation Freedom Paws has grown exponentially. We have grown from a locally-known organization to one that is recognized nationally and even world-wide. With this recognition comes the challenge of not being able to help all those who apply. Unfortunately, we are not yet in a position financially to expand to other parts of the country but that is part of the plan and we will get there! We have, however, grown here in California! So far this year we have added 37 clients and pulled 44 dogs from shelters and rescue groups. The number of clients has grown from 88 last December to 125 in June 2013. 85% of those clients are veterans and the remaining 15% are civilians and children. As part of the OFP program, we have identified clients who are now leading training sessions as mentor trainers. 95% of all dogs serving our clients have come out of shelters or rescue groups. For the first time, we have a fostering program with 10 to 14 dogs readily available to be matched with a new client. The entire OFP staff continues to strive to fulfill the mission of empowering veterans and others with disabilities to restore their own independence.

#### **Meet George And Macy**

PTSD is a cruel and disabling disorder that all too often accompanies our servicemen and women home from deployment. George is a Marine Corps veteran who was injured in Somalia. When I spoke to George, what I heard was a sweet, funny, gentle man who loves his family deeply. But my conversation with George occurred 2 years after he had been matched with his service dog Macy.

Before Macy, George describes his life as being unbearable. He had frightening nightmares and couldn't even go to the store without feeling overwhelming fear, anxiety and anger. Although he loved his family dearly, he didn't know how to talk to

them about what he was experiencing. His wife and children didn't understand why he would become so quiet and distant, so they assumed George was angry with them. For George, this life was pure torture.

In June, 2011, OFP matched George with Macy. On that day, life began again for him. George calls Macy, "the missing link between me and my family." Now if George gets quiet and lost in himself, Macy will lick his hand to get his attention. If that doesn't work, Macy will go, "be a tattle tale" and get George's wife. The family looks to Macy to help them better understand George.

George still has nightmares, which he describes as violent flashbacks. He often wakens, still experiencing the dream, not knowing where he is. In the past, he was terrified he would unintentionally hurt his wife or family during a nightmare because he has no conscious control. He doesn't want to harm anybody but says he had no control over his actions. Now Macy sleeps on George's feet. If George is having a nightmare, she will get up and lie on his chest and "hold him down," awakening him. George calls Macy his "safety net".

George enjoys doing things with his family now. They even take Macy to the movies. If the movie becomes too intense, Macy will nudge George's hand with her wet nose and remind him she's there. He no longer needs his "shield" (hat and sunglasses) to walk through the grocery store. He can have conversations with people when they ask questions about Macy. She is a popular girl, and George is always being complimented on how well she behaves. His anxiety in public has been replaced with his pride in her.

George's concern for other veterans came up frequently during our conversation. He goes out of his way to talk to them at the store or at other events. He is determined to help as many as he can, and always tries to encourage others by sharing his story. One of the people he met eventually reached out to OFP, was recently matched with a shelter dog, and is currently in training. I could hear the relief in George's voice while he was telling me this. He feels that veterans have no reason to suffer in silence because help is available. "But who would have thought a dog would be that difference?" But it was. Macy saved George's life.

"Life is better now," he says.

#### A Fun Day Had By All




