His car had broken down and he was sleeping in it during the night in the parking lot of the restaurant. He didn't know how he was going to get anywhere. So after speaking for a while we told him who to call and connected him with local services. It was a reminder that you never know what someone else has gone through, the story behind their circumstances, or what they may need. That day we were able to feed him and his dog. This was a simple act, but it helped this young man in the moment.

MEET SEAN AND MANNY

ARMY VETERAN AND HIS SERVICE DOG (ACTIVE CLIENT; 4 MONTHS WITH OFP)

The two and a half years before I came to Operation Freedom Paws (OFP) I probably left my house five or six times total. Then I came to OFP for my interview and they introduced me to Manny so my routine of not leaving the house changed very quickly. Coming to training twice a week and visiting Manny on "non-class" days changed a lot of stuff for me and it was hard at first...it was really hard, because I was so set in that routine of not leaving the house, not interacting with people.

After about a month of training, coming to classes twice a week and coming on "non-class" days once or twice a week, Mary asked if I wanted to take Manny home with me and I said, 'Yes!' right away.

From that point on everything changed drastically. I had to take Manny out, making sure we were doing our homework on "non-class" days. He made it possible for me to go out and do things that I haven't done in years; go grocery shopping, go to restaurants, go visit family, etc. It is now to the point where I can go grocery shopping and I don't feel completely emotionally drained from going to the store.




This last weekend I went to Great America with Dave (head mentor trainer) and his family. This was huge because it wasn't something I ever thought about as a possibility [since being home] to go out and do. It was hard, really, really hard, and stressful. And I may have pushed myself a bit too hard, I was there with them for almost four hours, but I wouldn't have made it thirty seconds before having Manny and the support from OFP.

Manny has improved my life in ways that I thought were never going to come back. for a long time, all I wore was basketball shorts because I didn't want to go clothes shopping. I had accepted at that point that if I couldn't get it online then I didn't need it and that would be my life. OFP and everybody here showed me it doesn't have to be that way. I don't have to be afraid all the time and I am not alone. I know that I had my family and people who loved/supported me but it is just a different dynamic than I was used to in the military. With Manny he is just there—it is not conditional, and that is not to say my family had any conditions, that isn't it at all, but with Manny he is just there.

I have had a bad history with nightmares and that was a thing that was really hard for me as well. Since Manny has been home


it is not that I don't have nightmares, because I have them, but I don't

remember them. Manny wakes me up in time and I can tell the difference between him getting me up so he can go to the bathroom versus him waking me up for a nightmare. With a nightmare he will stand there in my face licking me to wake up and if I acknowledge him and the job he is doing then he curls up and lays down on the bed next to me and goes back to sleep, if he needs to go out then when I wake up he immediately jumps off the bed. He has made it so that the nightmares don't have time to stick. [cont. pg.4]

My doctors ask me all the time how it's been having a service dog and I tell them that 'Manny is the most effective medication that I have ever had.' He has helped me with my depression, anxiety and PTSD and things like that, in ways that a medication never has. And it shows because I am able to go do things now. Without OFP and Manny I would still be that guy in basketball shorts, never leaving my house with the same mind set of, 'if I can't get it delivered to the house then I don't need it'. Whereas now, I recently went clothes shopping; all the clothes I bought could have been delivered to the house, but instead I got dressed and went clothes shopping. I tried stuff on to see what fit and what I liked and have actually been back out shopping twice since, just looking at stuff that interests me.

With everything that had gone on and everything that was going on, this was never going to be my life. This was never going to be for me. It is different now and I have all these people now that I know, care and rely on me and want to see me succeed. It has been amazing!
